- You can apply to all competitions of which you meet the requirements
- **IF** there is any exclusion criteria, it must be said in the notice.
[following our candidates experience]
- Check if there is any limitation to the reserve list. Some lists are only for recruitment from specific institutions or DG.
- But it can be derogated/negotiated [in the interest of service]
- If you are in two or more reserve lists, be sure when they recruit you, they pick you from the highest one.

where can I indicate international experience (such as Erasmus)?

The form in the Single candidate portal doesn't allow to introduce ERAMUS separately BUT it was part of your main diploma, right? Then you can introduce the info there, inside the overall diploma.

3. AM I ELIGIBLE?

Candidates must meet all the general and specific eligibility conditions (see Sections 3.1 to 3.3) on the closing date for applications except where stated otherwise in Section 3.3.

3.1. General conditions

A candidate must:

- 1) be a national of one of the Member States of the EU and enjoy full rights as a citizen;
- 2) have fulfilled any obligations imposed on them by the laws concerning military service; and
- 3) meet the character requirements for the duties concerned.

3.2. Specific conditions – languages

A candidate must have knowledge of at least two official EU languages, as provided for in Section 4.2.

3.3. Specific conditions – education and experience

- (a) To be eligible, a candidate must have a level of education corresponding to completed university studies of at least three years, attested by a diploma the award of which was decided no later than 30 September 2026. Please see Annex III for examples of minimum qualifications.
- (b) No professional experience is required.

2.3. Professional experience

- (1) To be taken into account, professional experience must meet the following general conditions:
- (a) it must be acquired after obtaining the required minimum educational qualification indicated in the notice of competition;
 - (b) it must constitute genuine and effective work;
 - (c) it has to be remunerated;
 - (d) it must involve a professional relationship, i.e. being part of an organisational structure or supplying a service;
 - (e) it must comply with the relevance criteria defined in the notice of competition. If only a part of the tasks carried out during a given period of professional experience can be considered relevant, the following rules will apply:
 - (i) if more than 75 % of tasks are relevant, the whole period of professional experience will be considered relevant;
 - (ii) if more than 50 % but less than or equal to 75 % of tasks are relevant, the given period of professional experience will be counted at the rate of 75 %;
 - (iii) if 25-50 % of tasks are relevant, the given period of professional experience will be counted at the rate of 50 %;
 - (iv) if less than 25 % of tasks are relevant, the given period of professional experience will not be taken into account.
- (2) Professional experience, as listed below, will also be considered in the light of specific rules, including certain exemptions from the requirements referred to in paragraph (1) above:
- (a) in the case of **voluntary work**, 'remuneration' is to be understood as any financial contribution received, including cost reimbursement and insurance coverage. Furthermore, voluntary work must involve weekly hours and have a duration similar to a regular job;
 - (b) in the case of **traineeships**, 'remuneration' is to be understood as any financial contribution received, including cost reimbursement and insurance coverage. A **compulsory traineeship which is part of a studies programme**, may be taken into account provided that (i) the traineeship is undertaken after achieving the minimum educational qualification indicated in the notice of competition, and (ii) the traineeship is remunerated;
 - (c) a **compulsory traineeship** which is part of a programme leading to, or which is a precondition for, registration with a professional association in order to obtain a **right to practise a profession** (for example, admission to the lawyers' bar association) may be taken into account irrespective of whether the work was remunerated. However, where the work was not remunerated, the traineeship period may only be considered provided that the programme was successfully completed and the right to practise obtained. In all cases, only the minimum compulsory duration will be taken into account;
 - (d) **compulsory military service** that occurred before or after obtaining the required minimum educational qualification indicated in the notice of competition will be taken into account, even where it does not meet the relevance criteria defined in the notice of competition, but only for a period not exceeding the obligatory duration in the relevant Member State;
 - (e) **maternity, paternity, adoption, or parental leave** may be taken into account if covered by an employment contract;
 - (f) in the case of **doctorate studies**, the period taken into account shall not exceed 3 years, provided that the doctorate was obtained, and irrespective of whether the work was remunerated;
 - (g) the period taken into account in cases of **part-time work** shall be calculated *pro rata*, e.g. half-time work for 6 months will count as 3 months.

In the form, you are asked to reply to a number of questions. For instance: "why do you want to work at the EU?" At which point in the procedure will these questions play a role?

Motivation & Strengths:

This information is very important as your answers will be read by the Selection Board and may be used at subsequent stages of the selection process. Please take time to think carefully about how you want to present yourself and what you want to write here. You may use up to 2 000 characters (including spaces and special characters (ç, ^, etc.) in each of the four sections.

- Questions will help you to focus and stay on the relevant info
- **FOR AD5 graduates** - Very unlikely the recruitment services will check your application. You apply by sending your CV (updated) and motivation letter
- **FOR Specialist competitions** – the questions help the board to understand your experience (CV) providing some context

(5) As a proof of their educational qualifications, candidates will have to provide:

- a copy of their diploma(s) and/or certificate(s) attesting to educational qualifications giving access to the competition (see section 'Am I eligible' in the notice of competition). In the absence of an official diploma, a statement of award or an equivalent document confirming the successful completion of the programme and the conferral of a title, degree, or diploma will be accepted as sufficient evidence;
- in cases of diplomas/certificates issued in a non-EU country, a statement of equivalency issued by a competent authority of a Member State;
- a letter, certificate, or equivalent evidence from the educational institution attesting to the standard duration of the completed study programme. This evidence must indicate the number of years required to complete the programme, as referred to in the specific point of the notice of competition on which the candidate relies to establish their eligibility for the competition.

2.2. Education

- Degrees, diplomas and/or certificates, whether issued in Member States or non-EU countries, must be recognised by a competent authority of a Member State.
- The differences between national education systems, in particular the differences between the titles given to degrees, diplomas and certificates, will be taken into account when assessing whether candidates have the qualifications required by the notice of competition.

- You don't need supporting documents for languages

 - **DIPLOMA**
 - **Attestation of the standard duration of your studies**

(6) All periods of professional activity must be covered by originals or certified copies of the following documents:

- (a) documents from former and/or current employer(s): employment contract(s) indicating the start and end dates of employment and/or first and last pay slips. These documents should indicate the nature, level, as well as a detailed description of duties performed, and they should bear an official header and stamp of the employer, and the name and signature of the person in charge;
- (b) for non-salaried work, e.g. self-employed/liberal professions: invoices or order forms detailing the work performed or any other relevant official supporting documents specifying the nature and period of the duties performed or services rendered;
- (c) for freelance translators: documents attesting the time periods worked and the number of pages translated;
- (d) for freelance interpreters: documents attesting the number of days worked, and the languages interpreted from and into.

- For work experience :
 - Recommendation letters duly signed, identified and stamped can be used
 - You can use several complementary documents to prove your experience
 - If not paid, it doesn't count
 - As you don't need experience in this competition usual criteria of working experience after degree doesn't apply

▼ How do the institutions recruit from EPSO lists?

As job opportunities arise, the institutions check the profiles of the successful candidates in the 'reserve list' to identify those who best match their needs (for example, in terms of education, professional experience and language skills).

The institutions may also choose to publish available vacancies to successful candidates of relevant selection procedures via their EPSO account.

The publication of vacancies in your EPSO account is the responsibility of the EU institutions. They decide which vacancies to open to which reserve list(s).

- **From experience , it's very unlikely the recruitment services will check your application to see your experience**
- **You apply by sending your CV (updated) and motivation letter to each vacancy once in the reserve list**

Reasoning Tests - Language 1 – 1 out 24 official EU languages

EU Knowledge, Digital Skills, EUFTE - Language 2 - 1 out 24 official EU languages and different from Language 1

- **Practice to check what is your most efficient approach** and which language to choose
- There are not right and wrong languages.
- In which language do you pay special attention? i.e sometimes being native on a language we have tendency to go faster than we should to pay careful attention. Some other times, being native helps us to pay that attention - be honest with yourself and check what you do most
- EU knowledge - on which language do you usually study/read about the EU?
- Written - you only have 40 min to be very efficient, which language fits you better on that?

where there is proctoring monitoring the candidate's behaviour in front of the screen, is it allowed to touch the screen with your hand?

⚠ Listed behaviours can lead to disqualification without retesting ⚠

- Incorrect peripheral setup
- Not completing technical prerequisite check
- Missing valid ID
- Not following ID/environment and desk check procedures
- Moving out of camera view
- Another person in room
- Talking or reading out loud
- Using unauthorized devices

Even if not listed, anything that can be suspicious / out of ordinary in front of the camera, better to avoid it.

Verbal reasoning: do they ask ‘Which of the following statements is correct?’ During the CAST (in Polish), this sentence seemed to be formulated in a different way – more ‘Which of the following statements is the most correct?’.

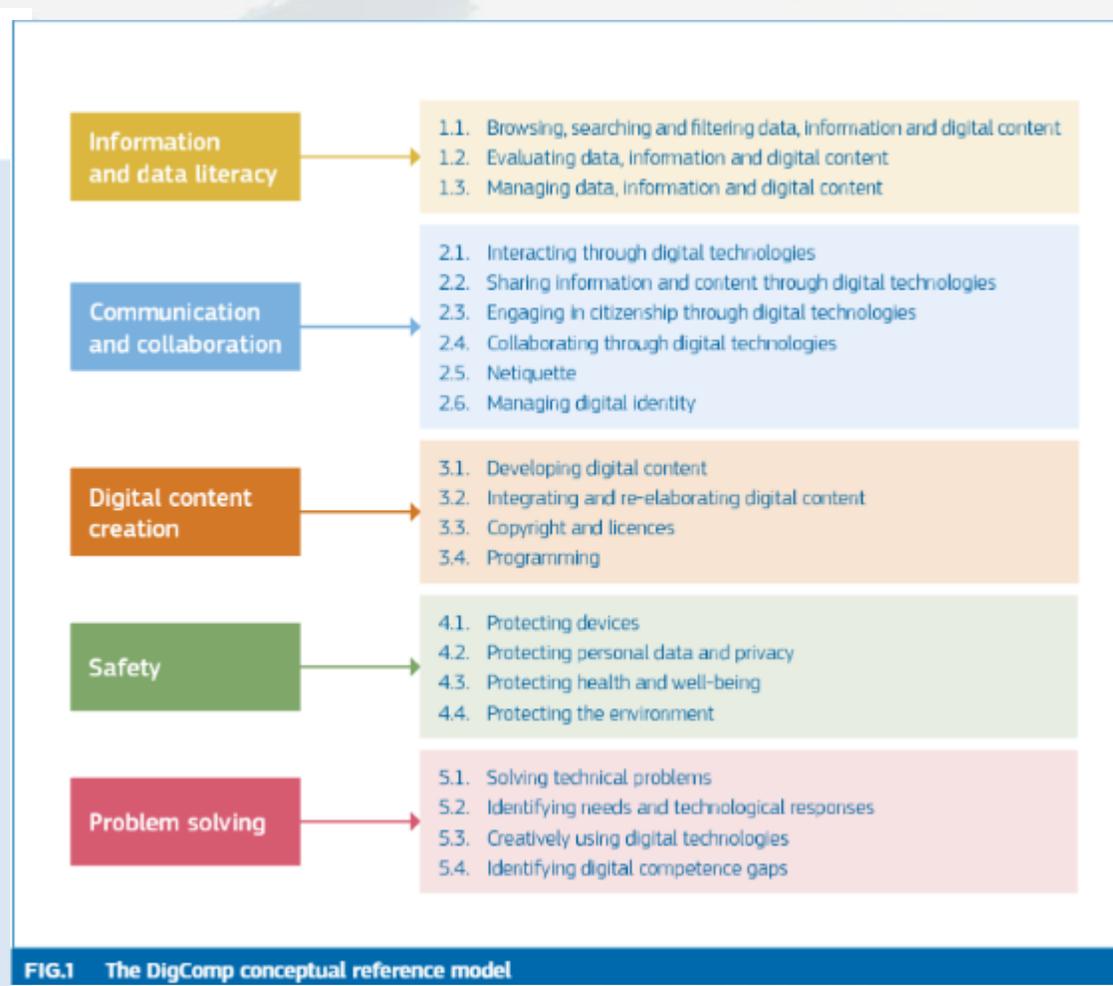
Verbal Reasoning test

The Verbal Reasoning test consists of several short texts, usually one or two paragraphs, accompanied by a question with 4 to 5 answer options. Candidates must choose the answer that best reflects the information given in the text. This test is part of the three reasoning pre-selection tests ([VNAR](#)).

- **‘Which of the following statements is the most correct?’ –reflects better what is required from the verbal reasoning.**
- **Verbal reasoning is not mathematics – it has a certain degree of interpretation so always choose the most correct option**

Algorithm

Could you explain what is expected from the EUFTE written test? How will it be structured and what they mean with the "Clear communication" instruction? Do spelling and grammar count toward the grade?

With EPSO's move towards a full 24-language regime a new type of test will be introduced by EPSO in its selection procedures, as of 2024: **the written test, a test aimed at assessing candidates' written communication skills**. The written test will replace the case study*.

Under the term written test, there are three different types of tests that EPSO will use according to the needs expressed by the recruiting services for each competition:

1. **Written test (WT)** related to the field(s) of the competition, assessing **only** written communication skills.
2. **Field-related written test (FRWT)**, assessing written communication skills **and** knowledge in the relevant field of the competition.
3. **Free-text Essay on EU matters (EUFTE)**, assessing **only** written communication skills.

Candidates will be required to respond to the test assignment(s) based on the documentation provided by EPSO and related to the field(s) of the competition, as specified in the notice of competition.

The written test is **not** a language test. Candidates will be assessed on the basis of the specific 'anchors' listed below ('anchors' are the elements taken into consideration by test markers (i.e. assessors) when assessing a given competency).

'Anchors' for written communication skills:

The candidate:

- Writes concisely without use of unnecessary words and sentences.
- Presents subject-matter in an understandable way.
- Adapts/tailors their writing to match the intended audience and purpose.
- Uses the information provided to deal with the assignment.
- Written communication is structured with a logical flow of ideas.

*Case studies will continue to be used for some ongoing competitions.

- As simple as difficult as fulfil the 5 anchors following the assignment given
- Provided mistakes don't hinder the 5 anchors, they don't count

Which measures will EPSO take to avoid that somebody cheats with AI?

6. Disqualification from the competition

- (1) Candidates may be disqualified at any stage of the competition on the following grounds:
 - (a) applying more than once to the same competition;
 - (b) making false declarations or declarations unsupported by the appropriate documents;
 - (c) cheating during the tests, recording online tests or attempting to manipulate the fair conduct of tests, or compromising the integrity of the competition process in any other way;
 - (d) contacting or attempting to contact a member of the Selection Board in an unauthorised manner;
 - (e) failing to inform EPSO of a potential conflict of interest with a Selection Board member or with an EPSO staff member;
 - (f) signing or making a distinctive mark on written or practical tests despite being instructed otherwise.
- (2) Candidates for recruitment by the EU institutions are expected to act with the highest possible integrity, in accordance with Article 27, first paragraph, and Article 28(c) of the Staff Regulations. In case of fraud or attempted fraud, EPSO may decide to declare a candidate ineligible for future competitions for a limited period of time.

- These are reasoning tests, it's easier to pass them preparing yourself than cheating.
